## SADLY, RECYCLING FIRES ARE TOO COMMON

In late May of this year, the city experienced a fire at its recycling yard at the Solid Waste Complex. Luckily, no solid waste, police or fire employees were injured, and there was no property damage. This is the city's third fire that has occurred in one year. Clearwater's fires took place in a recycling truck, at the storage yard, and at the facility that sorts the city's recycling.

Unfortunately, these kinds of fires are too common and happen when people either mistakenly or irresponsibly place the following items in recycling carts: hazardous items, electronics that contain heavy metals (such as lithium batteries) or volatile chemicals. None of these items are recyclable; some of them can't even be thrown into the trash.

Knowing what can and can't be recycled in Clearwater's recycling program helps combat recycling contamination, which could lead to dangerous fires like this one. ## KEEP THE SUMMER SAFE FOR OUR WATERWAYS

Summer rains wash fertilizer into our lakes and waterways, spoiling our water and ruining the summer fun. That's why it's illegal in Pinellas County to fertilize lawns during the rainy season, and it's also the reason slow-release products are required the rest of the year.

Now through September, skip the fertilizer. Fertilizers containing nitrogen and/or phosphorus cannot be applied to lawns or landscape plants, according to Pinellas County ordinance.

Incorrect use of fertilizer can allow nutrients to leach into the groundwater and wash into storm drains that flow to creeks, lakes, Tampa Bay or the Gulf of Mexico. Excess nutrients can cause harmful algae blooms, which lower oxygen levels and lead to fish kills. The treatment to remove these nutrients costs taxpayers millions of dollars each year. Nutrient pollutions can be controlled with your help.



## LEARN ABOUT GOVERNMENT FROM THE INSIDE OUT

HOME REHABILITATION  
LOANS AVAILABLE THROUGH  
THE CITY OF CLEARWATER

The city of Clearwater’s Economic Development and Housing Department may help homeowners who qualify with code-related repairs. A Clearwater homeowner can receive up to \$40,000 in a home rehabilitation loan through Clearwater’s Housing and Rehabilitation Loan Program.

Examples of home improvements:

- Roof replacement
- Electrical repairs
- Plumbing repairs

- Air conditioner installation
  - Door and window replacement
  - American with Disabilities Act modifications
- To qualify:
- Applicant must own and occupy a single-family home, townhome or villa
  - Applicant must have current homeowners insurance
  - Household income must be 80 percent or less of the area median income

- Funds may be available to assist clients at or below 120 percent of the area median income
  - Other qualifications may apply

NOW AVAILABLE ONLINE

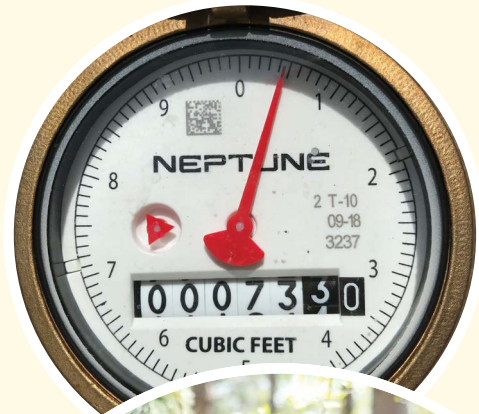

ALERT PINELLAS

Receive alerts about emergencies and other important community news by signing up for Alert Pinellas, an emergency notification service for Pinellas County. Alert Pinellas allows you to sign up to receive urgent messages on a variety of situations, such as severe weather, boil-water notices, missing persons or evacuations. This service is free to residents. When you sign up, you choose how to receive alerts. This could be a cell phone, landline, text, email – you can enter multiple methods.
